EVERYTHING YOU ALWAYS WANTED TO KNOW ABOUT NMRRT

The Rapid Response Team (RRT) in New Mexico is important so that multiple agencies may establish best practices in their response and continuing follow up for any feed or food borne illness that might present itself in human and animal food contamination. It will help prepare for and effectively respond to foodborne illness outbreaks and other food emergencies.

On April 18 at the eighth Annual Food Protection Alliance, NMRRT gave its first presentation to an audience of those involved in the protection of food in the state of New Mexico.



ROMAINE LETTUCE OUTBREAK

March 13 – May 23, 2018 E. Coli contamination

209 became ill in 35 states
89 hospitalized and 5 deaths
Multiple growers, harvesters,
processors, and distributors in the
Yuma area have made it difficult
to trace back to origin of contamination.
